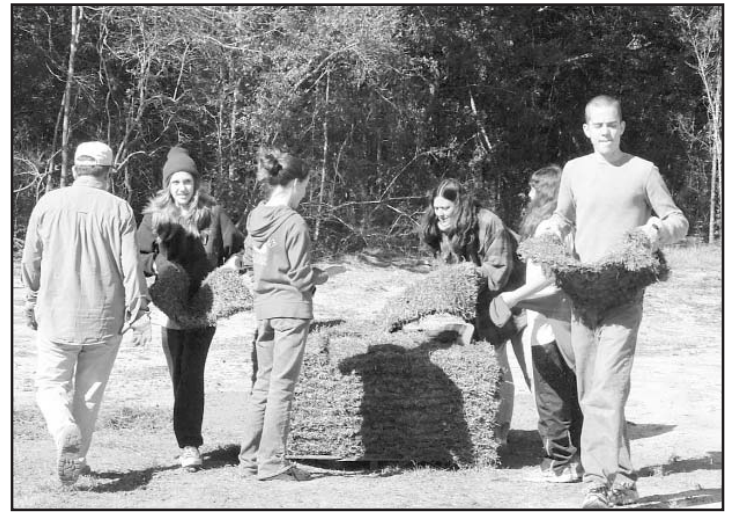

### ECHO Builds and Builds

Episcopal Church Habitat Outreach (ECHO) consists of four local Episcopal Churches who support Pensacola Habitat for Humanity. Habitat for Humanity International welcomes volunteers from all faiths who are committed to Habitat's goal of eliminating poverty housing and providing decent affordable home for low income working families. The Pensacola area Churches are Christ Church, Holy Cross, St. Christopher's, and St. Francis.

ECHO volunteers have built six houses since 2000, five in Pensacola and one in Milton.

Tom Deppe, a vestryman from St. Christopher's, was the founder and coordinator of ECHO. At the time Tom was serving in the Navy as an instructor

pilot. He enlisted the aid of Al Marretta, a Habitat volunteer and member of Christ Church, to be project director. When Mr. Deppe invited other Churches to join ECHO he said, "It is easy leading this group because there's a lot of energy available. People have come with unique gifts, have brought enthusiasm, have felt themselves led here by God, and nobody feels overburdened. This is clearly not just about house building. It's also about community building, relationship building, and faith building." When Tom entered seminary in 2001, Al Marretta became ECHO Director.

ECHO contributes \$25,000 and 5 work days towards each build. Volunteers spend two days framing, and one work day each on roofing & siding, painting, and landscaping. Volunteers must be at least 16 years

# Rector's Meditations

My Dear Sisters and Brothers;

The journey of Lent begins and we find ourselves in the next forty days in our own desert with the one who will attempt to deceive us. The deceiver tried without success to remove the "cross" from the Christ and now the deceiver will attempt to do the same to you! The question is simple enough. Will you stand alone bewildered by the world's deceptions or will you allow Christ to transform you into His glory?

St Paul gives us a message as we begin our journey together as a community of faith. "Our firm decision is to work from this focused center: One man died for everyone. That puts everyone in the same boat. He included everyone in his death so that everyone could be included in his life, a resurrection life, a far better life than people ever lived on their own... Now we look inside a person and what we see is that anyone who is associated with the Messiah gets a fresh start, is created new. The old life is gone; a new life burgeons! All this comes from the God who settled the relationship between us and him and then called us to settle our life with each other. In Christ God put the wrong on him who never did anything wrong, so we could be put right with God." 2 Corinthians 5: 14-21

Every lent has been for me a time of reflecting upon the graciousness of a loving God who has restored me as

his child through grace. God's amazing grace is there to restore me in times of hardship, affliction, and tumult; in times of hunger, calamity and sickness; and in times of peace and war, surplus and prosperity. God's love is offered to me in times of distress and in times of accomplishment; in times of triumph and failure; in times of righteousness and in times of sin.

## Music Direction

After Christmas, I decided to read Andrew Carnegie by David Nasaw who teaches history at City University of New York. Normally, I don't read 800-page books but it was highly praised and I love to read biographies of the rich and famous.

Known in his time as the Star Spangled Scotsman, Carnegie, who came over from Scotland with his family on borrowed money, became the Captain of Carnegie Steel and the richest man of his time.

By the time of his death in 1919, (b.1835), he had given away more than \$350 million dollars (in the tens of billions today). After he retired and sold his business to J.P. Morgan of U.S. Steel, he literally tried to give away his fortune. He believed that it belonged to the community which had enabled him to make it. In this belief he stood head and shoulders above the robber barons of his day.

But as a church musician, the thing that struck me was this. Carnegie loved music and during his lifetime donated 7689 organs to churches and music halls costing more than \$6.25 million: 4092 in the United States, 2119 in England, 1005 in Scotland and hundreds more in other English-speaking nations and colonies.

At Skibo, his 40,000 acre estate in the Highlands of Scotland, Carnegie entertained his guests with organ music morning, noon and night at mealtime and hired profession-

al organists to do the playing. He once told a friend: "the organ performances at Skibo are my substitute for family prayers."

Carnegie donated his first church organ to the Swedenborgian chapel he and his father had attended in Allegheny City near Pittsburgh. He donated \$2 million for the construction of a music hall on W. 53rd Street in New York City which opened in May 1891. It's known the world over as Carnegie Hall.

Tenebrae Service Set for Palm Sunday. The service of Tenebrae commemorating the final hours of our Lord's life on earth is set for Palm Sunday evening at 6:30 PM. The spirit of Tenebrae is one of solemn meditation and reflection.

Our Tenebrae Service was written and arranged by Hal Hopson, a well known organist and composer of church music. His arrangements of several familiar hymns and anthems will be feature oboe, string quintet and organ or piano.

This deeply moving and meaningful service of music, readings and candles will last about one hour. Attendees will leave a dimly lit sanctuary in silence. Come and bring a friend. You'll not want to miss this highlight of Holy Week at Holy Cross.

### Chicken Casserole

Add 1/3 to 1/2 can of water for mixing.

Bake @ 350 for 20 - 25 minutes.

I like onion; so I add onion to the recipe. I usually cook it in the microwave so that it's not crunchy in the recipe. If I buy the chicken breasts, I boil them and use the stock for mixing, instead of plain water.

old, however an exception is allowed on landscaping day. Volunteers under age 16 may help with adult supervision. There have had as many as thirty people out on build day. A participating church provides lunch for the volunteers on build days, and Habitat provides all tools & equipment. ECHO work parties provide the opportunity for inter-church and inter-generational fellowship.

Habitat is not a giveaway program. Instead, Habitat is a joint venture in which families who qualify for a home work side-by-side with their building partners. Each family must invest 300 hours (sweat equity) in construction. Homes come with a mortgage which the owner repays to Habitat at zero-profit and zero-interest rates. Monthly payments are kept affordable and are often below the rent formerly paid by families. In addition, house payments are recycled to build additional homes.

The average cost of a three Bedroom house now is about \$65,000. This does vary due to cost of the land,

There are many opportunities for you to participate in the work of the church. We now have appointed each vestry member to a specific church ministry. Under each of these ministries are sub-categories that will need a charge person. Our intent is to post these in the narthex, the office and parish hall. So, if you will review and have any interest in one, then simply contact the vestry person in charge. I am sure you will be put to work.

Betty Salter, Pensacola Habitat Executive Director, has this to say about ECHO, "We are very grateful for all the support, partnering, and cooperation that we have from the community. Pensacola Habitat has now built 620 houses in Escambia and Santa Rosa Counties since its inception in 1981. Our dedicated volunteers built 55 homes in 2008. Our overhead is only 5%. We run a tight ship."

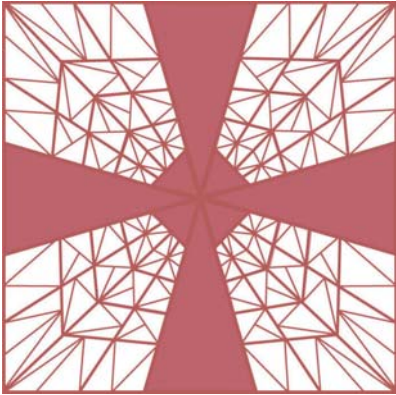
