The Faith of Eunice

Early on, due to both my skepticism about Jesus and my God-given inability to enjoy small talk, I used to very much enjoy asking believers why it was they believed in Jesus. And during those early years of my faith, I noticed that responses to this question usually fell into a few different categories. Some people quoted Bible verses or recounted Sunday School lessons. Others shared vivid, even mystical, experiences of Godhearing His voice, seeing His face, feeling His hand. These stories that stretched the imagination (and sometimes my sense of the storyteller's sanity) were always my favorites. But lately, I've been reminded of another kind of response—one I used to overlook, as if weak.

Some would say: "I don't really know why I believe in Jesus. I guess I just grew up going to church. I've always gone, and I've always believed."

A lifelong Baptist once told me he felt cheated because he never had a dramatic conversion or profound moment of being "lost and found." He had simply always been a Christian. He knew and loved Jesus—and for that, he sometimes worried that his faith wasn't as real or deep as others'.

While I would have never said so out loud, in those early days of faith, I think I probably would have agreed with him. I thought of that kind of steady, *inherited* faith as being shallow—something that hadn't wrestled with the big questions and therefore couldn't hold up under real struggle. (Don't tell my wife, but... I guess I really am wrong sometimes.)

Paul writes to Timothy, "I am reminded of your sincere faith, which first lived in your grandmother Lois and in your mother Eunice, and, I am persuaded, now lives in you also" (2 Timothy 1:5). I've come to realize that it was probably my pride that kept me from appreciating the quiet strength of those who had simply followed Jesus as their parents and grandparents had done. I had bought into the idea that faith must be rooted in my personal experience alone—<u>my</u> own reason, <u>my</u> own

emotion, <u>my</u> own answers to life's questions—and in doing so, I was blind to the wisdom and witness of those I had every reason to trust.

It reminds me of Thomas, who said, "Unless <u>I</u> see the nail marks in his hands and put <u>my</u> finger where the nails were... <u>I</u> will not believe" (John 20:25). His doubt was honest, but so was the faith of those whom he trusted and loved who had given him their testimony.

It turns out that the faith of these "always believers" is actually not shallow at all. Quite the opposite—their faith is planted in soil enriched by generations of Christian formation. It springs from the roots of a family tree. And while no one's faith is unshakeable, when trials come, theirs will be the faith that will not fall onto the hard ground of self-reliance, but onto the shoulders of loved ones who came before—strong, faithful witnesses devoted to God and to family.

Somewhat ironically, what was once my least favorite answer to my favorite question has become the answer I now hope for from my own children, from our church, and from the world. We certainly don't advocate mindless belief (and in this church, we never will), but we also must be cautious not to reject what is good and true simply because it was handed down to us by others, especially our loved ones.

I've come to believe that God cares more about our willingness to follow than about the reasons we can articulate for believing. So, I encourage you: find your reasons. And know that you don't have to find it alone. I would be honored to hear why you believe in Jesus—or why you don't—and to share why I do.


